RESIDENTS HOLD BALANCE OF POWER ON COUNCIL

FULL ELECTIONS STORY

As a result of the Basildon Council elections held last Saturday week the four Independent Resident Councillors from Billericay hold the balance of power on the Council. The constitution of the new Council is:-

The major question that arises as a result of this situation is - "Who will be the next Chairman of the Council?" Strongly tipped contenders are Labour Group Leader Cllr.Alf Dove, and Conservative A.P.Phelps, the present Vice-Chairman, and the lone Conservative among the Billericay Councillors. The election takes place at the Annual General Meeting of the Council to be held at Timberlog Secondary School on Thursday (May 24th) at 6.50 p.m.

The results were a disaster for the Conservatives, who failed to get any of their candidates elected, and for the Communists who lost their single seat on the Council. However, it was a day for jubilation for Labour, who shattered the Conservate control of the last three years, by gaining five seats; for the Residents who did a hat trick, and got all their candidates elected at Billericay; for the Liberals, who got a candidate on the Council for the first time.

Despite cold, overcast weather, with intermittent heavy showers, the poll was heavier in all wards than last year, the highest poll being at Billericay (51.4%) and the lowest at Laindon (26%).

Nearly 500 people crowded into the gymnasium of Craylands Secondary School, Basildon, where the count was held, to see the declaration of the results. Labour supporters were equipped with a noisy handbell and a football rattle, with which they attempted to drown the cheers and boos of the other groups.

The state of the parties at the beginning of the count was:Conservative 10, Labour 5,
Independent Residents' Assn., 1.

The first result to be as ounced was Barstable Ward at 9.50 p.m. Here, the Labour candidate kept his seat, with an increased percentage of the poll, despite opposition from the Conservatives and Communists.

Next result declared was that of Laindon. Here the Conservatives lost two seats to Labour. This was closely followed by Pitsea, where Labour gained a further seat from the Conservatives. The state of the parties was now:- Conservatives 10, Labour 9, Ind.Residents 1.

The next result was from Central Ward, where Labour captured a seat from Communist Councillor Roy Hollands (who was originally elected in 1958 as a Labour candidate) with a majority of 674 over the Conservative, and 1,133 over Mr.Hollands. The two parties were now level.

Next result was Fryerns, where Labour leader Alf Dove was convincingly re-elected. However, the other Labour candidate, Mrs.C. Gibbs (of Sunnymede, Billericay) was 432 votes behind Mr.Dove, and only 170 votes in front of the Liberal Mr.R.Skingley, who was contesting this supposedly-safe Labour ward for the first time. The position was now:- Labour 12, Conservative 10, Ind R.A., 1.

The next result was from Wickford, where one Liberal and one Socialist were elected in a close fight. This result was a surprise for even the firmest Labour supporters, who considered Wickford to be a Conservative stronghold. Labour were now three ahead of the Conservatives, with an overall lead of one.

All eyes now turned to Billericay. By winning all three seats the Conservatives could still draw level with Labour. However, their hopes were shattered when the Returning Officer, Mr.A. Hatt, climbed on to the platform and declared the three Independent Residents' Association candidates elected, at 11.30 p.m. Labour was the largest group, but it had no power. For the first time in the evening, the large contingent of green-rosetted R.A. supporters went wild with enthusiam.

BILLERICAY ELECTION RESULT. From Column 1.

Commented Cllr.H.E.Wilkins, who defeated the then Conservative Council Chairman, W.H.Davies, in Billericay last year, and has been for the past year the lone voice of the Independent Residents on the Council; "I am very pleased indeed that the people of Billericay have elected three more Independent Councillors, sponsored by Billericay and Buttsbury Residents' Associations. Team spirit, and an increased number of helpers helped us to win the day."

Asked what their policy would be Cllr. Wilkins said; "As before we shall judge all problems on merit. Particular problems facing the district are protection of amenities, the revised development plan for Billericay to be discussed this year, new Schools and Grammar School places, Further Education & Community Centres, the problems of frontagers in roads being made up, Surface Water Drainage and prevention of flooding, Highway Improvements, the protection of the Green Belt, and the improvement of Health and Transport services. We shall support voluntary organisations, particularly those concerned with Old People's Welfare".

Two Conservative Councillors lost their seats at Billericay, and both were behind the Liberal candidate (Mr.L.Wernick). The other Conservative, Dr.F.W.B. Rilstone, fighting for the first time, was well ahead of Mr.Wernick.

The Conservatives to lose their seats were Mr.A.F.Quirk and Capt.J.J.A.Tesoirere (Retd.) Mr. Quirk was first elected in 1957, was re-elected in 1960, and resigned this March in order that the public could express a vote of confidence in him, following criticism of his handling of planning matters. For the past year he was Chairman of the Development & Planning Committee, and has taken an active part in many other committees. Cllr. Tesoirere was first elected in 1959, and has served on several committees.

RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATIONS AND FINANCE.

Dear Sir, --- In their election manifesto the Residents' candidates state they will use "modern methods of organisation to offset rising costs. The "modern methods" will surely be unable to provide the additional finance needed for the new Schools, expanded Clinics, Home Nursing, and Midwifery Services, and the improved roads promised by the candidates.

How can they be paid for? Not by loans, for "the minimum amount of borrowing" is another promise. The only solution is higher rates, but that is not mentioned in the manifesto.

It would be quite simple to provide all the services outlined by the Residents, if expenditure was cut down on such luxuries as a super sports centre, and a super swimming pool for Basildon, without any increase in the Rates.

PARTY POLITICS AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

Dear Sir, --- I read with interest your articles in the "Billericay Observer" (8th May) dealing with the local elections. However, in the light of the recent results, I feel that the contrast drawn between the sitting political groups on the Basildon U.D.C., and the third, that of the Billericay Residents' Association is somewhat over emphasised.

As an ordinary member of the Labour Party I helped to select and support a candidate who was elected to the Council. As a Councillor I will expect him to support the programme which I helped to formulate, and for which he stood. Similarly I would expect all others who were elected on the same programme to act in the same way. Thus they would form a group in the Council. This is then what I call "toeing the party line". At this stage I would strongly refute the suggestion that the group is dictated to by Transport House.

Having said this, I am at a loss to understand how the R.A. Councillors are in any way different in this respect. I presume firstly the R.A. have in mind a particular programme of work they would like to see the Council put in effect and that they would wish the representatives they sponsored and supported to work to that end.

Therefore it is quite apparent that they are not "independent" and will thus constitute a group similar to the other two, and are simply a third political force in the Council.

I have attended Council meetings for four years, and I am tired of the "block" voting of the two main groups. Far better, that these vital decisions be made on merit. 

TUDOR & STUART BILLERICAY.

The excellent survey of Billericay carried out in 1593 by the famous map-maker Ralph Aggas, gives us a good idea of what Billericay was like in the later part of the reign of Queen Elizabeth 1st. The map is extremely detailed, and literally "shows

every tree".


Coming into Billericay in 1593 along "the waie leading to Chilmsforde" the first houses one met where were the Hospital now stands. Other houses stood where the railway cutting now is, and on the triangle of land (where the Crown now stands) formed by "Via ducens Billericae versus Northsee Woods (Norsey Woods), the "waie to Chilmsforde", and the lane now called the Crown Bye-Pass, but then urnamed. Another three properties stood in "Newe Street" (the modern Western Road), where the town's tanyard was also situated. The High Street was built up as far as the Red Lyon Inn (which existed on the same site in those days), with scattered properties as far up as Sun Corner.

There was one property in Chantry Way, then called according to the map, Wellfield Lane. Chapel Street is not named, but an unbroken line of houses is shown as far up as the modern "Coach & Horses", and isolated houses as far up as Hillside Road, from where it continued as a tree-lined lane, past a sandpit and a ginger grove, to its junction with Sun Street, then devoid of properties. A few houses in Laindon Road - "via ducens a Bellericaie versis ecclesiam de Bursted Magna et vers Horndon" completes the picture

of Billericay town as it was in 1593,



M.P. ASKS FOR BETTER BUS-RAIL CONNECTIONS.

"Walking seems to be regarded by most people in the countryside today as one of the tiresome results of a poor bus and railway neither complacent or apathetic service, and both can be deplorable when it comes to local government. on occasions", said Mr. Edward Gardner Q.C., M.P. for Billericay, speaking in a debate on Rural Transport in the House of Commons

last Friday week.

Continued Mr. Gardner: "Some bus services in the countryside, quite obviously, are inadequate, but surely one of the most infuriating characteristics of the rural bus is its almost sadistic time-table. Far too many rural buses seem to leave the local railway station just before the train in which one is travelling arrives, or reach the railway station just after the train in which one hoped to travel has left. This apparently careful mistiming is repeated daily throughout the country, with a waste of uncounted hours, and of saintly patience. It does not seem that it would be very difficult or take a great deal of thought to cure this eccentricity in rural travel".

CHURCH PLANS REVISED.

Plans foraa £17,000 church to serve the Outwood Common and Sunnymede areas of Billericay have been revised, and a more realistic plan is being drawn up, it is stated in the current issue of Great Burstead Parish Church magazine.

The article also states that a scheme of house visiting has been give attention to. It is not on started in the area, asking people to take the Parish Magazine. Already 250 houses have been covered, and it is hoped to cover the entire area in this way.

That is, the numbering of Stock Road and Norsey Road (and possibly Potash Road). Stock Road is nearly two miles long; Norsey Road is nearly 1½ miles long. Both are heavily built up. It is almost impossible to find a property in either of these roads I have spent hours trying to find been told of one case of an ambulance running up and down Stock Road for some time trying to find an address. Luckily, it was not an emergency call. But supposing it was? Or supposing there was a fire or a burglary? This numbering should be carried out as soon as possible.
