NEW CHURCH AND PARISH PROPOSAL

Speaking at a meeting at Christ Church, Perry Street last Thursday week on the subject of a new Church for Perry Street the Rev.S.Powley, Vicar of Billericay, said that he saw no reason why Perry Street should not become a seperate parish from Billericay, with a resident priest, in five or six years' time. The Vicar went on; "You are fortunate in having a church-cum-hall in which you can worship, until your new Church is built. It is not the right attitude to say 'I would come if there was a better Church'. You have a nucleus of people, you have a splendid site, and you have a growing population of 5,400 people. The policy of having a new church is obviously a long-term one, but every policy has to have a beginning, and the best thing is to get going as soon as possible. I will be, as you know, leaving the Parish within a few weeks, but I am sure that the next encumbent will take an active interest in your project".

The Chairman outlined the history of the Church. Up to 1933 the parishoners in the Perry Street area had had to go to Buttsbury Church for worship. They decided that they would like a Church in Perry Street, the present wooden building was erected, and consecrated on January 29th

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Outlining the activities of Christ Church the Chairman referred to the Boys' Choir, recently re-formed, the Scouts, Cubs, Guides, and Brownies, the Young Wives, who had an average attendance of forty, and the Sunday School and Bible Class. There was an average attendance of 180 at the Sunday School, and he felt that more could be achieved through the children to the parents than by any other means. New proposals were for an electoral roll and road visiting. An Anglican Young Peoples' Association was also needed.

For the Guides Mrs. Trumeau saidethat she felt that it would be very nice if the meetings could be held in one building, and one could go to Church in another.

Among the money raising functions memtioned were Fetes, Jumble Sales, Coffee Mornings, and weekly self-denial offerings. A Committee was elected to deal with all matters in connection with the new Church.

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ENTRIES DOWN AT HORTICULTURAL SHOW.

There were 216 entries in the Annual Summer Show of Billericay Horticultural Society at the Archer Hall on Saturday - compared with 312 in 1959 and 380 last year.

Commenting on the Horticultural

and Floral Art Section the judges F.L. Bradbury and J. Harper said; "The show although small was extremely bright and a few exhibits were of an exceptionally high Drought conditions no doubt influenced the number of entriesbeing provided in the park. and now rain has come we expect to see the Autumn Show fill the hall The Floral Art Classes once again. were very good although there was not the competition of former years.
Perennials were clean and bright and gladipli and roses were reasonably good"

Commenting on the Cookery Section Mrs C.A.Wilby said; "The small number of entries in some sections was disappointing and the standard achieved varied greatly. The jam sponges were of very poor standard, The jam and Maderia Cakes were satisfactory. Greater care had obviously been taken programme at the School. with entries in the jam and wine section, and some good results were achieved".

NEW SECONDARY SCHOOL MAY HAVE PRACTICE SWIMMING BATH.

At last Tuesday's meeting of Basildon Education Committee it was decided to ask the County Education Committee to provide a learners' swimming bath at the Mayflower County Secondary School instead of a second The school, which will gymnasium. be built on a site off Stock Road, will eventually be a five-form entry school. It is intended that the Swimming Bath will be provided as part of the second instalment of the building

NEW FOOTWAY TO PRIMARY SCHOOL?

The Basild n Education Committee have referred to Basildon Council's Works Committee for favourable consideration a proposal from the School Managers of Buttsbury County Primary School that a footway be provided to the School on the north side of Perry Street as an additional safety measure. A school crossing patrol was recently established in the vicinity.

SCHOOL MANAGERS COMPLAIN ABOUT LACK OF CAR PARKING SPACE AT SCHOOL.

Following a complaint from the managers of South Green Primary School that the car parking space at the school was inadequate, Basildon Education Committee have asked the Worls Committee to speed up the widening of Hickstars Lane and the construction of a footpath in order This was announced at the to allieviate the position. The Committee stated, in their reply, that it would be impossible to provide a large enough Car Park for all the cars that arrive on odd days in the school year. In addition the cost of extra parking space would reduce the amount of money available for the actual school building, and therefore a reduction in teaching accommodation or in adequate facilities would have been necessary.



RESIDENTS ANGRY OVER FAILURE TO PROVIDE FOOTPATH.

On the advice of their South Green Sub-Committee Billericay. Residents' Association are writing to the County Highways Department regarding the provision of a footpath from the South Green Memorial Hall to Burstead Drive, and Mill Road to Armstrong Whitworth's factory along the Southend Road (A129). They are also asking for lighting to be extended from Tyrells Road to Armstrong Whitworth's factory.

In correspondence to an individual resident the County Highways Department assured him that provision for a footpath from Burstead Drive to the Memorial Hall had been placed in this year's estimates. Later, however, they stated that this had not been possible owing to lack of finance. Also, five years ago, residents in houses between Mill Road and Armstrong Whitworth's factory raised a petition for a footpath, but still no footpath has been constructed.

Commented Mr. Featherstone, Chairman of the South Green "There have been Sub-Committee; several accidents on this stretch of In the last month there have been two accidents near Armstrong Whitworth's factory - one when a car overturned and hit a telegraph pole, and one when a boy was run over by a car and taken to a hospital with a broken leg. Apparently, owing to the lack of a path the boy ran straight out into the road and was knocked down. The absolute non-existence of lighting makes things The absolute nonworse. In addition, of an evening, workers from Armstrong Whitworth's factory have to walk along this something was done".

Commented Mr. Poulton, father of the five-year old boy who was run over; "There are verges in front of these houses, apparently for road widening and construction of a footpath. There was talk of a footpath here as far back as 1933, but there is still no sign of one".

GRASS FIRES KEEP FIREMEN BUSY.

A spate of grass fires, because of the hot weather, has kept Billericay Fire Brigade busy in the last fortnight. 9 grass fires have been attended in Billericay, Laindon, and Shenfield. On two occasions the Brigade have stood-by at Laindon Fire Station. Last Monday week they attended, with Wickford Fire Brigade, a fire in an outbuilding at Downham, which was completely destroyed by fire.

THUNDERSTORM DID NOT AFFECT FETE TAKINGS.

A heavy thunderstorm during the afternoon did not affect the takings at the Roman Catholic Fete in the grounds of the Church of the Holy Redeemer in Laindon Road on Saturday - £130 was raised.

The fete was opened by Father Harden, priest at Hutton. He said that the fete was "in God's back garden". He said that the Fete was more of a social afternoon for the parishoners, rather than a money raising affair. However, all the proceeds went towards the Church Extension Fund, and perhaps at the same time next year the first fruits of this fund might be seen.

When the thunderstorm came, about one hour after the Fete opened, everybody moved into the Church Hall where the children were entertained with a Punch and Judy Show. After the rain had stopped business resumed once more.

A fancy dress parade was judged by Miss N.Corcoran, a former Headmistress of Buttsbury C.P. School, and a parishoner for forty years.

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

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"BILLERICAY IN THE PAST".
by the Editor. Series 2. No.8.
Chapel House.

A little way along Chapel Street and nearly opposite the rear of the Church stands Chapel House, now a private house, pebbledashed with a part slated and part tiled roof. The house was formerly three holdings: One was the part which was formerly the Chapel - the tiled portion - which was copyhold, the second part was the rest of the house which was freehold, and the third part being the garden at the rear, formerly held on a yearly tenancy from Major Spitty of "Hurlocks", and purchased on the sale of the Chantry Farm Estate in 1917.

The Deeds go back to December 23rd, 1829, but evidence suggests that the oldest part of the building was erected in 1799. A document of September 2nd, 1812 survives, which apparently is a detailed account made to the Rev.T.B.Crowset of Upminster, at his request, by Richard Fry of Bilston, Staffordshire, who apparently advanced the money for the building. Among the interesting items are "Paid to Mr. Turtle for the ground and old building thereon" £30 (some difference in land values in the centre of Billericay!) and £4-12-0 for "Beer for workmen and a raising dinner". The Chapel survived until recently much as it was left by the builders, although it had apparently been shortened for living accommodation. It contained a tiny gallery and old closed pews, each with a seperate door.

"The New Meeting" was founded by dissenting members of "The Old Meeting further down Chapel Street, the Baptists coming in later. The Rev. T.B. Crowset was probably a visiting Minister.

The tenants in 1820 were five sisters named Mead. In 1829
Mr.Crowset took up the tenancy of the house, and in 1833 he purchased the house, and appears to have become Resident Minister. He was also an Architect & Surveyor, and his design for the Town Hall in 1830, now the Council Chamber is still in his great-granddaughter's posession. He died in 1849, the property passed to Thomas Pease, who had married his only daughter, and was an important Carrier in the area. In 1876 the property was purchased by Samuel Harrington, Baker of Ramsden Crays. It has remained in the Harrington family ever since.

ROUND AND ABOUT by "WANDERER".

The Red Cross do excellent work at their First Aid Post in Lake Meadows on summer weekends. However, should an accident occur during the week there is nobody qualified to give First Aid, nor is there a public ±elephone box there to summon assistance. It is too much to expect of the Red Cross, a voluntary organisation to be there during the week. However, Billericay Residents' Association have a suggestion which they think might be the awnser simply train the park keeper, who is there all the time, in First Aid. a resul! a life might be saved. All it would cost would be a few extra shillings in the park keeper's pay packet every week. Apart from the question of summoning an ambulance the nearest public telephone was in Lake Avenue but was moved to Stock Road - I feel that a public telephone box would be of great assistance in Lake Meadows. I hope that the Council agree to these suggestions from the Residents' Association. Cost - small as it would be - should be no object.

I have noticed recently that the Festival Garden - gift of an annonymous donor - has been less tidily kept recently. This garden has wonderful views of the countryside for miles around, and it would be a great pity if it was spoilt because it was not being kept properly. Once this corner was a private market and an eyesore - I hope that the Council will tidy up this garden and plant some more flowers, otherwise it may become an eyesore once more.

The Hospital League of Friends, and all the organisations who took part in their Fete this year must be congratulated on the wonderful amount raised. This time most of the money has been spent on the Hospital staff, but it is important that the Staff should have the best opportunities for

recreation.

I hope that the Council and County Council do something about the lack of a footpath at South Green. Yet again the excuse is finance. While I appreciate that a careful watch must be kept on expenditure I feel that this footpath is an urgent necessity, in view of the number of accidents which have occured in this area, and so is the lighting. The Southend Road is a heavily used "A" Class road, and something must be done before there is another accident.
